## SOLSTICE

Last Friday at 11.44 am (solar noon) Mr Richardson's year 9 mathematics class measured the latitude of Toormina and the circumference of the earth. We recreated the experiment first done by Eratosthenes in 240 BC.



Basically on the Winter Solstice at Solar Noon (11.44am) the angle the sun's ray makes at the top of the stick is equal to the latitude plus 23.5 degrees (the earth's tilt on its axis), from the latitude it is an easy calculation to get the circumference of the Earth.


#### Year 9 results -

We calculated the latitude as 29.4 degrees. This is very close to the actual figure of 30.17 degrees. The restaurant Latitude 30 is named for this reason.

We found the circumference to be 40,081 km which compares favourably with the accepted measurement of 40,030 km.






# Reconciliation NSW School Challenge

# Art Program.

As part of THS's ongoing commitment to creating supportive learning environments, 15 Year 8 students participate in the High Potential Gifted Education (HPGE) art program. Tutor Gabrielle Brabander has worked with students on various projects over the past 12 weeks, including drawing, painting, sculpture, and storyboarding.

Students have enthusiastically embraced experimenting with previously untried creative mediums and techniques, producing excellent results. Writing accompanying artist statements reflecting on processes has been essential to the HPGE art program.

Using everyday still-life objects as abstract subjects, students considered shape, form, and harmony. Using a limited palette to promote visual tension and design, HPGE participant Emmerson commented, "I learned the power of using complementary colours." Eric noted, "My art is usually realistic drawings; through this exercise, I learned a lot about abstract art."

Students are currently exploring tension, balance, and shadow drama through kinetic sculptures. Monica was excited with the result, "shadows being a part of the artwork makes it much more interesting."

In other HPGE art, students are collaborating to write and illustrate a 36-page graphic anime work. Set in a fantastical world, the story follows the adventures and conflicts of a group of monster hunters (doubling as an 80s rock band) as they navigate their unique world and maintain balance in their realm.

# When you vape why do people now call it an aerosol and not vapour? What's the difference?

You'd think that because electronic cigarettes (or e-cigarettes) are often called vapes that's what they would produce when they are used – a vapour. In fact, they don't – these devices produce an 'aerosol'. There's quite a big difference between the two, particularly in terms of what you're inhaling when you vape. Put simply, a vapour is a gaseous state of something that is normally a liquid (e.g., steam is a vapour, it's the gaseous state of water). When a vapour is released it will continue to spread until completely mixed with air. Most importantly, it contains nothing else but the gas itself.

Aerosol is quite different as it's a mixture of tiny liquid particles suspended in a gas. Instead of just mixing with the air, like a vapour would, the aerosols produced by vaping can leave tiny droplets behind. These droplets or residue contain a range of chemicals and substances. Some of these will be listed on the packaging, such as propylene glycol and glycerin (both used as food additives and solvents in pharmaceuticals and cosmetics) and whatever flavouring has been added to the liquid.

Others won't be found there as these are not added during the manufacturing process. These are produced and then found in the aerosol due to chemical reactions caused by heating the device or the flavourings. The heating of e-liquid flavourings has not been well researched but it appears that this poses the greatest potential risk to lung health.

We're learning more about the chemicals found in aerosols produced by e-cigarettes all the time and there is great debate about their potential risks. It is clear, however, that those who use these devices are not just vaping 'harmless' water vapour.



















# KIDS HELPING KIDS, BY WRITING A BOOK IN A DAY




