


TOORMINA HIGH SCHOOL REFERENCING SYSTEM

Book Multiple authors	Use as first citation in the text: Clasgow, McNary, and Hicks (2006) state that this can take time Clasgow, McNary, and Hicks (2006) This can take time (Glasgow, McNary, & Hicks, 2006) Use for subsequent citations: Clasgow et al. (2006) investigated this When a work has 2 authors, always cite both names every time the reference occurs in text. When a work has 3, 4, or 5 authors, cite all the first time, and then for subsequent citations use et al after the first author. Lee "end" within the text and an ampersand inside parentheses. Book Organisation as author	When they are readily identifiable through abbreviations, for the first citation in text: The National Institute of Mental Health guide on bipolar disorder (Nithir, 2009). A description of bipolar disorder (National Institute of Mental Health [Nithir], 2009) For subsequent citations: NIMH (2003) When organisations do not have an abbreviation write it in full:	National Institute of Mental Health. (2003). Bipolar disorder. Washington, DC: US Department of Health and Human Services.	Varies – usually Book
