Toormina High School were proud participants in the first Northern New South Wales Philosothon held at Bishop Druitt College on 15-16 November. Philosothons are philosophy competitions that foster higher order thinking skills and focus on the individual's contribution to the 'success' of the discussion, rather than the individual's ability to present or develop their own opinions. The winners and runners-up from the contest are now eligible to attend the Australian Philosothon in Melbourne in 2013. Over one hundred students entered the competition. And included students from Government and non Government schools from Central Coast to Tweed Heads and west to Armidale. Some of the schools competing were Bishop Druitt College, The Armidale School, Central Coast Grammar and Saint Joseph's Port Macquarie. The topics discussed were: Does sport necessarily develop good character? Is it moral to fake kindness? Can you lose your mind? Science needs a Hippocratic Oath and Do we own our bodies? A team comprising Damon Lewis, Brian Adam, Lil Ross, Beau McAuley and Justin Pryce won their division with exceptional results.

Launched in 2012, our successful THS positive rewards program is driven by student achievement and their positive attitude towards receiving awards and rewards. These awards and rewards are a great incentive to promote achievement and participation in and out of the class.

HOW IT WORKS:

• Each Student carries a small booklet (100 stamp spaces) and each teacher a stamp.

• Students may politely nominate themselves for a stamp, as well being initiated by teachers. The idea being that students become pro-active and part of the process and help remind their busy teachers about the stamps. It breeds a culture of achievement with students wanting and striving to be the best they can.

REWARDS and AWARDS

- 25 stamps = \$5 off a school event or cost of their choice (not canteen) eg. Social, excursion, fees, etc.
- Each page (6 stamps) = raffle ticket in end of semester, latest and greatest, lpod Touch draw.
- 5 stamps in any one subject/activity = SUBJECT AWARD

After Thursday assembly, SRC reps record the number of new pages a student has filled. Students take their booklets to the office to have any subject awards recorded. This ensures if booklets are lost, rewards can be re-credited.

SUCCESS

The SNAP booklets have been so successful that it has put a massive dent in the SRC funds. So much so that we had to severely restrict spending on projects this year from monies raised throughout 2012! All the more impressive is that it was conceived, funded and driven by the SRC who spend a lot of their time in maintaining it.
