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The 'Toormi Tradies Garden Club'

Members of Toormina High School Garden Club have installed a vegetable garden in the agriculture area of the school. The students have conditioned the soil with mushroom compost and mulched the plot with sugarcane bagasse. They will tend the garden as part of their mathematics curriculum, which integrates mathematics into real life situations. This is a project instigated by Craig Holden, Head Teacher Mathematics, to educate students on the use of mathematical principles in horticulture. Students have measured the growth rates of plants and calculated the amount of fertiliser required.

Their supervising teacher, Dudley Bertram, along with assistant Ms Sue Flick, explained that the student garden provides hands-on experience for students to observe the life-cycle of edible plants over the course of a year, as the students plant, cultivate and harvest the crops. The students have discovered the challenges of horticulture, enduring raids from galahs, loose chooks, wood ducks and ducklings who like to eat the lettuce and dill seedlings. So... somewhere out there in the region are pre-seasoned ducks and ducklings.

Students are excited to be sharing their knowledge of planting and caring for a garden with other students and plan to prepare a slide show for some of their classmates, which will promote gardening and environmental issues. Members participate in garden study, take horticultural field trips and have prepared floral arrangements for the administration offices. Staff in the agriculture area have helped by making sure the plot was irrigated, for this the students are very appreciative. Students have seen the results of their hard work and this culminated in the successful sale of their first batch of produce on Wednesday, week 2. Students will continue to sell their produce each Wednesday morning at recess in the hall outside the library.
