When we boarded the train at quarter to ten on Wednesday night, I was dreading the thought of three days away from home, missing major syllabus points in science and who knows what in English. Standing in the wind on the platform the only place I wanted to be was curled up in bed, but a carriage full of students and teachers bursting with excitement quickly rubbed off on me. After a henna session courtesy of Miss Schafer; the travesty of Lainey's missing camera battery and not quite four hours of sleep, we finally stopped at Central Station.

With the first glimpse of Sydney I was struck by how the buildings were so unlike anything in Coffs, it was something grand and if we weren't so tired would have explored further. Sydney has a really interesting mix of modern and antique architecture that gives it a feeling of being new and updated but still full of history and class, which is exactly what it is.

On our way to the Art Gallery of New South Wales we walked through the Botanical Gardens, this is when the cameras came out and stayed out until we left Sydney on Saturday. It was refreshing to walk through the gardens and be able to appreciate the natural beauty. I think it reminded us all that art is in everything and we often don't notice. Inside the gallery I was amazed by the architecture which had a very natural feel and still combined modern and classical themes. I am not a 'building nerd' but you just can't help but notice these things, as they were very impressive. The contemporary "art" I saw on the walls encouraged a lot of critical thinking and discussion from our group.

The Frida Kahlo exhibition was amazing. I am so glad I knew a little about her before I got to see her work. In that gallery we could see the immense detail of her confronting subjects, her strength and vulnerability, and mostly her determination to do something meaningful in spite of her constant pain.

We were given a very special opportunity to be part of an artist workshop with Leanne Carr (Curator of Art Express) and Marilyn Schnieder (a former Toormina High School student) to help prepare us for the HSC. They were definitely worth listening to, especially if you want your major work displayed in the Art Express exhibition at the Gallery. I wish we'd had more time because I missed half of the works in the gallery.

On the same morning we visited the University of Technology in Sydney, also known as the "Ugliest Building in Sydney". There we met with another former Toormina High School student, Pat Grant, who teaches the Master of Design. Pat marched us up seven flights of stairs to see all of the creative labs, while trying to convince us all to go to Uni.

We finally got to rest our feet for a couple of hours, then we all got dressed up and caught the bus to the Capitol Theatre to see the much anticipated stage show, Aladdin. The Greek themed architecture in the theatre was a highlight and the musical itself was impressive, with a great deal of attention to detail. "This is mind blowing," said Zion in the interval.

Day two felt like day four and with calloused feet we visited the White Rabbit Art Gallery. The meaningful work and it's context was presented to us by the very enthusiastic curator, Phyl Rowlinson. Phyl clearly loves sharing his knowledge and helping people understand the confronting pieces which dealt with important issues that most people never think about like; Parkinson's disease, the westernisation of Asia and also about major philosophical questions like the 'God debate'.

The works were odd and confronting and a little hard to look at, which is what made them so powerful.

After having lunch with the teachers I discovered, and this trip was all about discovery, that I like jasmine tea but not when it's boiling hot and all over me. We all discovered that art can be found in limitless forms and everyone was inspired a little. Wandering the harbour at night to see the rainbow projected over the water at the top of the Sydney Opera House in a storm was my favourite part of the excursion.

The vibe of the city built of art as well as being surrounded by all kinds of artistic people encouraged us to capture and create at every opportunity, especially those subjects that seemed so mundane at home.

On behalf of all of the students who continued to walk cold, wet, sore and tired just to get the most out of the time we had, I want to thank Mr Francis and Miss Schafer for organising and taking us on this huge and awesome excursion. There is so much I've forgotten to mention and please can we go back in exam week?



REGULAR ATTENDANCE = BETTER LEARNING

Often students and parents do not see that regular and punctual attendance at school is important. Nothing could be further from the truth. Besides missing out on valuable content - students miss out on information, discussion and skill development that is the pathway to success and the development of high self-esteem. The following chart highlights the impact of non-attendance and partial attendance over time. Viewed in this context, the implication of regular absenteeism is startling.

The table shows the cumulative effect of persistent non-attendance over the period of schooling from Kindergarten to the end of Year 10.
