We asked some of our students to reflect on their experience of 2020.


Year 7

In 2021 we will add a Junior AECG and hold community Yarn Ups. Our staff have worked to provide knowledge, support and encouragement to our students to value culture and education.

Students were still able to attend TAFE Taster lessons, work experience and complete a White Card Construction industry course.














Students lock their phones in the pouch during the day reducing phone use at school.




