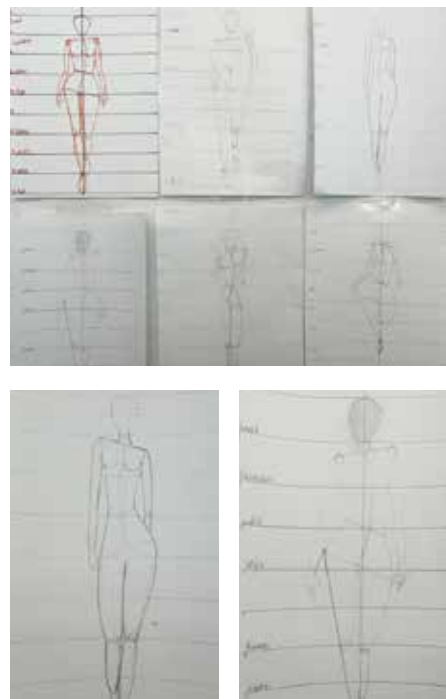
### Textile and Design

#### Diversity of autism

- examines parent's knowledge of autism and how autism directly impacts their child at home and school
- investigates a range of practical strategies to use at home and school to improve learning outcomes

#### Working together

- examines ways for parents to strengthen partnerships between home, school and community
- increases awareness of support and services for families and how they can be accessed
- explores ways parents can advocate more effectively for their child's needs
- helps parents develop a plan for moving forward

#### Understanding sensory processing

- explores sensory processing and the different ways children on the autism spectrum can be impacted by sensory needs
- identifies strategies that can be used to help manage and support children experiencing sensory processing issues

#### Understanding behaviour

- examines the function/purpose of behaviours

## Premier's Reading Challenge



The NSW PRC is now open and THS is excited to be participating!

### What is the NSW Premier's Reading Challenge?

The PRC is a statewide Challenge that encourages students to develop a love of reading for leisure and pleasure in students and enables them to experience quality literature. It is not a competition, but a challenge to encourage each student to read, to read more, and to read more widely.

Students who complete the challenge and have their reading record validated by the school's PRC coordinator, Mrs Gillingham, will receive a certificate signed by the Premier of NSW.

### How many books do students need to read?

Year 7 to Year 10 students are challenged to read 20 books independently. At least 10 must be from the relevant Challenge booklists and up to 10 books can be personal choice books.

If a book is from an approved PRC series, students can enter 5 books as Challenge books, and can read up to 10 other books from the same series as Personal Choice books. More information on the rules of the Challenge can be found [on the PRC website](#).

Books must be added to a student's online reading record by **Friday 22 August 2025** in order for their reading record to be validated and receive a certificate.

### How do students log their reading?

Students can access the PRC's [Student Experience site](#) using their DoE username and password, or can log into the site via the Student Portal. A video guide explaining how to use the Student Experience site can be found [here](#).

# Educational Pathways Program



The Educational Pathways Program (EPP) is commencing in our school this year, following its success at nearby Woolgoolga High School since 2020.

It is an innovative careers program designed to improve higher education and career outcomes for our students.

The program has successfully operated since 2020 within the Grafton School Group of Maclean High School, South Grafton High School, Grafton High School and Woolgoolga High School.

This year, Toormina High School and Coffs Harbour High School have joined the Grafton School Group.

The Educational Pathways Program features 8 initiatives including:

- Innovative Careers Education (Careers events, parent & industry engagement)
- Enhancing School Based Apprenticeship and Traineeship Opportunities (SBATs)
- TAFE NSW Early School Leavers program (assisting school leavers under 17 to transition to a TAFE course)
- Back in the Game program (a referral service to support students to transition to Vocational Education and Training (VET) and employment)
- Job Readiness Workshops
- TAFE NSW Start Your Future program (1 day a week, free TAFE taster courses across a range of different industries)
- Educational Pathways VET Ambassadors (Guest speakers discussing VET career pathways)
- Apprenticeship & Traineeship Head Start program (Group Training Organisations offering fee-free pre-apprenticeship courses to students)

EPP Head Teacher Careers David Youman is leading the program, with the assistance of EPP SBAT Engagement Officer Kate Hogan, EPP School Administrative Officer Emma Darbin and our school Careers Adviser.
